The National Guard of this state will assemble in camp for instruction at Lake View, as follows:

Third Infantry—Col. F. P. Wright commanding, June 8th to 17th, inclusive.

Second Infantry—Col. Joseph Bobleter commanding, June 18th to 27th, inclusive.

First Infantry—Col. W. B. Bend commanding, July 9th to July 18th, inclusive.

First Battalion Mounted Troops—Maj. J. B. Hawley, commanding, July 9th to July 18th, inclusive.

2. For all purposes of pay, or claims for pay, the dates as herein fixed must include all time consumed en route to and returning from camp.

3. The commanding officer of each organization will have full charge of the camp and its appurtenances during the time his command shall occupy the same, and will be held accountable, not only for the department, discipline and instruction of his command, but also for all public property in and about the camp.

4. The usual consolidated morning reports will be rendered to these headquarters daily, and also a general report from each camp commandant at its close.

5. The commander-in-chief expects much from this encampment. It is his earnest desire to see the National Guard of this state reach and maintain the highest degree of discipline and efficiency, and to that end it is imperatively necessary that every member thereof should lay aside his usual avocation and devote himself to this encampment. In this manner only can the highest point be reached, and if followed in letter and spirit, the State of Minnesota will have reason to feel proud of its guard.

6. Any company failing to maintain during this encampment 75 per cent. of its record strength, will be subjected to a rigid inspection with a view to its muster out of service.

7. Inasmuch as guard duty is the most important of all the duties of a soldier, commandants are especially urged to give this branch of instruction the attention it deserves. What is worth doing at all is worth doing well.

8. Capt. Charles Bentzoni, Twenty-fifth Infantry, U. S. A., has been detailed by the secretary of war to inspect the troops at this encampment.

He is a soldier of long experience, high attainments and a most thorough gentleman. The commander-in-chief congratulates the guard upon this appointment.

GENERAL ORDERS,

1. Small arms practice will be required the present season of all officers and enlisted men of the Minnesota National Guard (excepting the two batteries of artillery) at the annual encampment at Lakeview, Minnesota, unless excused by the commanding officer.

2. Blunt's "Small Arms Firing Regulations" is adopted as authority on all points or questions not provided for in orders from headquarters.

3. Score books will be furnished each company, and the entire muster roll must be written therein, with initials, officers first, privates in alphabetical order, before going to the range. Scores will be recorded on the range as made, and must be written in ink. Any erasure or alteration in the scores as first recorded, must be done by the company commander, who will attach his initials to the figures so altered as a certificate.

4. No scores will be regarded as official unless made at a target to which the company or shooter is assigned. Targets number one to ten will be assigned to the ten companies of each regiment, who will occupy the same relative positions as on parade, the left company taking target number one and the right number ten. Target number eleven is for the band, and number twelve for the field and staff officers. When the cavalry troop is in camp they will use target number twelve, and the field, staff and band number eleven.

5. Target practice will always be held in the presence and under the supervision of a commissioned officer, who will appoint an instructor to give the men at the firing points such hints on position, aiming and adjusting sights, as may be found necessary. The instructors are to be under the direction of the inspector of small arms practice, subject to the supervision of the General Inspector of small arms practice. The inspectors of small arms practice will have charge of the range, markers, scorers and signals, with power to detail assistants and scorers. Company commanders will render him assistance, and see that his directions are complied with.

6. Any company not practicing with at least fifty per cent. of its number at class firing and forty per cent. of its enlisted men at volley and skirmish firing, as shown by the Inspector General's report for 1889, will be published in the Adjutant General's report as "delinquent in target practice."

7. Scores made in any class in regular matches at the annual tournament of the Minnesota National Guard Rifle Association, in which the full military conditions have been observed, and which are accepted by the officers of that association, will be recognized as official, and decorations will be awarded accordingly.

8. The allowance of ammunition is limited to fifty rounds per man actually practicing, and company officers will see that the best possible use is made of it.

CLASSIFICATION.

1. The entire guard will be classified in five classes, viz: Sharpshooters, marksmen, first, second and third classes.

2. The sharpshooters' class will consist of all who make forty-four by adding their highest two hundred and five hundred yards scores together.

3. The marksman's class will consist of all who make at least fifteen at each distance, two hundred and five hundred yards, but fail as sharpshooters.

4. The first class will consist of those who make at least fifteen at each distance, one hundred and three hundred yards, but fail as marksmen.
5. The second class will consist of all who practice, but fail as first class men.
6. The third class will consist of all who do not practice at all.

REGULATIONS FOR FIRING.

1. Firing will commence at the one hundred yard range; when all have completed one score, firing will commence at three hundred yards. All who have qualified in the first class will next fire at two hundred yards, and when one score has been fired, will fire at five hundred yards.
2. Scores will consist of five shots each, and five scores only at each distance will be allowed during the encampment.
3. Two sighting shots will be allowed at five hundred yards on the first score of each half day. If the shooter desires no sighting shots, he must so notify the scorer, else the first two shots will not be recorded. After the decision is once made it cannot be changed.
4. All officers and men must shoot through the regular classes (except those who qualified as sharpshooters in 1888, who will omit the one hundred and three hundred yard ranges), and are not allowed to shoot for a second or higher score after qualifying in the sharpshooters' class. The record will stand upon the highest scores made at each distance.
5. No one will be allowed to fire two consecutive scores at one distance if others are waiting to fire. Trial practice between the classes will not be permitted.
6. The position at one hundred and two hundred yards will be standing; at three hundred yards sitting or kneeling, and at five hundred yards prone.
7. After a score sufficiently high to admit the shooter to the marksman's class has been made, further practice must be made without any assistance from an instructor or coach.
8. The A target will be used at one hundred and two hundred yards, and the B target at three hundred and five hundred yards.
9. All qualifying in the sharpshooters' and marksmen's classes will be awarded the state decorations. If the first qualification, a badge; if a subsequent qualification, an 1889 bar.
10. This being the fifth year of target practice under the present system, all who have qualified as sharpshooters for the fifth time will receive a special gold bar, and will hereafter be classed as "distinguished riflemen."

SKIRMISH FIRING.

The troops will practice skirmish firing by company, from five hundred yards to one hundred and fifty yards and return, making three halts on the advance, and two on the retreat, and firing two shots only at each halt. Sixty seconds will be allowed from the command "commence firing" to the command "cease firing," in which time the sights must be adjusted, piece loaded, position taken, and the two shots fired. Target B will be used. Commanding officers should plainly instruct their men before the advance what is expected of them, that there may be no delay in getting into position at the various halts, nor any undue haste or carelessness, having the element of safety in view at all times.

The skirmish line will be formed in front of the five hundred yard firing mounds; the first halt will be at about four hundred and twenty-five yards; the second about two hundred and seventy-five; the third about one hundred and fifty yards. After the third halt the line will be still further advanced (twenty-five or forty yards) before the command "to the rear, march," is given. The halts on the retreat will be at about two hundred and twenty-five, and three hundred and fifty yards.

As soon as the last shot is fired, assemble on the right (or left) so that the next company may deploy. During this time the marking can be done.

While manouevring to the rear the muzzles of the pieces must be in a general way pointed toward the targets.

VOLLEY FIRING.

Firing in ranks will be at one hundred yards, the company being formed in single rank. Fire by company, three rounds. Fire by company, kneeling, two rounds.

CARBINE PRACTICE.

The first troop of cavalry will practice with carbines at same distances, and in the same order as infantry. The qualifications will be thirteen at each one hundred and three hundred yards for first-class, and thirteen each at two hundred and five hundred yards for marksmen; and forty in two highest scores for sharpshooters. All other regulations for infantry will apply to cavalry.

REVOLVER PRACTICE.

Revolver will be permitted, though not required, of all officers and men of the First Troop of Cavalry and First and Second Batteries of Artillery, and all general and regimental and staff and line officers, and sergeants of infantry.

The distances will be fifty yards upon the A target.

Three scores of ten shots each allowed; highest score to count. Ties settled by *Paragraph 651, Blunt*. No revolver of less than 38-calibre allowed, and not less than three pound trigger pull. The makers of the three highest scores will be awarded a gold, silver and bronze bar respectively.

The General Inspector of Small Arms Practice will conduct the carbine and revolver firing.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

Attention is especially called to a few changes in the qualifications this season. Among the more important are the "prone position" at five hundred yards, and skirmish firing. Officers should become familiar with skirmishing so as to manage their commands to the best advantage. The penalty for firing more than two shots at a halt; or firing after the command "cease firing," has been given, is to have five points taken off the company's score for every shot so fired. In case but one shot is fired at any one of the halts the man will not be allowed to fire three shots at some other halt to make up his ten shots during the run. Any position is allowed in skirmish firing.

Captains will see that the complete muster roll is made out in the score book in ink, and the initials, or one given name and initial added; also that pen and ink is furnished for the range. Stylographic pens are most convenient. The scoring must be done by a non-commissioned officer of another company—first and second companies changing scores; third and fourth, fifth and sixth, and so on.

Each company will keep the same number of target throughout the encampment.

Each company should bring one or two field glasses to assist in spotting at five hundred yards. Left handed marksmen must take position as laid down in tactics in volley firing.

This being the first season of revolver practice, it is not expected all qualified to shoot will be supplied with revolvers of army pattern; but any thirty-eight or larger calibre revolver having regulation trigger pull may be used. The revolver will be held in one hand, arm extended, and aim deliberately taken, the other arm being at the side or behind the back. The scores will not enter into the classification, but will be published in the adjutant general's report. Any kind of ammunition allowed where the bullet is seated fast in the shell so it may be carried in a belt. Filing or altering sights is prohibited except the rear sight may be slightly enlarged and the front sight widened, but its shape not otherwise changed, when found necessary to adapt them to peculiar eyesight.

1. The annual rifle matches of the Minnesota National Guard will take place at camp Lakeview, on Wednesday, Sept. 4th, 1889.
2. The matches will be four in number, viz: a regimental team match, a company team match, a commissioned officers' match, and an enlisted men's match.
3. Regimental teams will consist of ten men each, a captain and two alternates from each regiment of the Minnesota National Guard; distance 200, 300 and 500 yards. Ten shots at each distance. The regiment securing the highest aggregate total, will receive a suitable trophy from the state.
4. Company teams will consist of seven men each, one team from each company of the National Guard; distance 200 and 500 yards. Seven shots at each distance. The three companies having the highest aggregate totals, will receive suitable trophies from the state.
5. The commissioned officers' match is open to any commissioned officers of the Minnesota National Guard. Distance 200 and 500 yards, ten shots at each distance. The three highest aggregate totals, will receive a gold, silver and bronze badge from the state.
6. The enlisted mens' match, is open to all non-commissioned officers and enlisted men of the Minnesota National Guard. Distance 100, 200, 300 and 500 yards. Five shots at each distance. The three highest aggregate totals, will receive a gold, silver and bronze bar from the state.
7. The "A" target will be used at 100, 200 and 300 yards. The "B" target at 500 yards. Position, standing at 100 and 200 yards, sitting or kneeling at 300 yards and prone at 500 yards. No sighting shots at any distance.
8. Transportation will be furnished to regimental and company teams. Application for transportation must be made as soon as Sept. 1st. Three days per diem, (at \$1.50 per day) will be allowed members of regimental teams only.
9. Ammunition will be furnished for regimental and company teams' matches, and the state team in the Washburn Inter-state match, but not in the individual matches. Any kind of ammunition allowed, where the bullet is seated fast in the shell and no lubricants exposed. No ammunition will be issued for preliminary practice.
10. The matches will be conducted by Major C. M. Skinner, Gen. Inspector Small Arms Practice, who will at the close of the matches, or as soon thereafter as practicable, select the state team of twelve men and four alternates, for the ensuing year.

This report will include the names of all officers and enlisted men who were in camp less than five days; their residence, occupation, date of enlistment and cause of absence.

In all cases where the delinquency was caused by the refusal of employers to grant the employe the necessary leave of absence, the name, nature of the business, and address of the individual, co-partnership or corporation employer will be also carefully noted.

Especial care will be taken to note any instances where a member of the National Guard has lost his situation or been thrown out of employment by reason of his presence in camp. The information herein sought, must be full and complete, embracing all the material facts, otherwise the report will be returned for correction. In many instances the attendance in camp was less than fifty per cent of the number present for inspection. It has become fashionable to prepare for inspection by filling every uniform with something to be counted. The count over, the sum of seven dollars per man allowed by law is then demanded with commendable promptness. Speedy advantage is taken of the exemption from jury duty, and the gallant warrior slumbers in peace, safety and contentment till the next annual inspection. Why need he attend drill or camp, is he not a member of the National Guard?

This is an imposition on the state and ought not to be winked at.

2. Small Arms Firing Regulations, as used in the United States army, is adopted as authority on all points or questions not provided for in orders from headquarters.

3. Each company will be furnished with a record book, and the entire muster roll must be entered therein with initials, officers and non-commissioned officers first, to be followed by the privates in alphabetical order.

4. Scores will be recorded on the range in duplicate on the score cards furnished each company, and must be written in ink or indelible pencil. Any erasures or alterations in the scores as first recorded must be done by an officer on range duty, who will attach his initial as a certificate to the alterations.

5. No scores will be regarded as official unless made at a target to which the company or shooter has been assigned.

6. Target practice will always be held in the presence and under the supervision of a commissioned officer, who will appoint instructors to give the men at the firing points such hints on position, aiming and adjusting sights as may be found necessary. The instructors are to be under the direction of the inspector of small arms practice, subject to the supervision of the general inspector of small arms practice. The inspector of small arms practice will have charge of the range, markers, scorers and signals, with power to detail assistants and scorers. Company commanders will render him assistance, and see that his directions are complied with.

7. Any company not practicing with at least 50 per cent. of its number at class firing, and 40 per cent. of its enlisted men at volley firing, as shown by the Inspector General's report for 1890, will be published in the Adjutant General's report as "delinquent in target practice."

8. Scores made in any class in regular matches at the annual tournament of the Minnesota National Guard Rifle Association, in which the full military conditions have been observed, and which are accepted by the officers of that association, will be recognized as official, and decorations will be awarded accordingly.

CLASSIFICATION.

1. The entire National Guard will be classified in five classes, viz.: Sharpshooters, marksmen, first, second and third classes.

2. *Recruits' Course* will consist of five shots (each) at 100, 200, 300 and 500 yards. All who make a total score of 40 will be eligible to shoot in the regular course. Recruits will be those who have not, in previous years, qualified as marksmen and sharpshooters.

3. The *Regular Course* will consist of two scores of five shots each, at 200, 300 and 500 yards, and one skirmish run of ten shots from 600 yards to 200 yards. On the skirmish run five shots will be fired advancing and five retiring; one shot being fired at each halt.

4. All who make a total score of 60 in the regular course, will constitute the *Second Class*.

5. All who make a total score of 80 will constitute the *First Class*.

6. All who make a total score of 100 will be constituted as *Marksmen*.

7. All who make a total score of 120 will now fire two scores (five shots each) at 600 yards, and make one more skirmish run, firing ten shots. Those, in such firing, who make a total score of 200 will be classed as *Sharpshooters*.

8. The *Third Class* will consist of all those not practicing.

9. *Carbine Firing* will be at the same distances and number of shots as infantry at known distances, but skirmishing will be from 500 to 100 yards. The same totals as for infantry will be required for places in the several classes.

10. Two sighting shots will be allowed at 500 and 600 yards. A preliminary skirmish run of ten shots will be permitted at the discretion of the regimental inspectors of small arms practice.

DECORATIONS.

1. All qualifying in the sharpshooters' and marksman's classes will be awarded the state decorations. If the first qualification, a badge; if a subsequent qualification, an 1890 bar.

2. All who have qualified as sharpshooters for the fifth time will receive a special gold badge, and will hereafter be classed as distinguished riflemen.

VOLLEY FIRING.

1. Volley firing will be at 200 yards, the companies being formed in single rank. The targets will be twelve standing silhouette figures in close order, placed upon the ground. Five volleys will be fired—three in the standing position and two kneeling or sitting.

2. The scoring in volley firing will be the same as prescribed in paragraph 349, Small Arms Firing Regulations.

GENERAL INSTRUCTION.

Attention is especially called to the changes in the qualifications this season. Officers should become familiar with skirmishing, so as to manage their commands to the best advantage. The penalty for firing more than one shot at a halt; firing before the command, "commence firing," or after the command, "cease firing," has been given, is to have five points taken off from the individual's score for every shot so fired. Any position is allowed in skirmish firing.

The attention of company commanders is called to the regulation that in skirmishing either to the front or to the rear, the piece must be carried with the muzzle pointed in the general direction of the targets.

First Lieutenant Oskaloosa M. Smith, 22d U S. Infantry, having reported under orders from the headquarters of the army, will be in attendance upon the encampments of the National Guard, to supervise the target practice.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 7.

Mounted officers of the National Guard of this state, are entitled under the law to the same compensation, while on duty, as officers of a like grade in the regular army, and should provide themselves with saddles, bridles and other property necessary to a prompt mount.

All state saddles were properly issued to the mounted battalion, and the quartermaster thereof is liable to the state, under his bond, for their care and custody. It is irregular for him to loan them, and unfair to urge him to do so. Mounted officers must therefore, provide their own outfit.
