## GENERAL ORDERS NO. 8.

May 1, 1905.

1. The organizations of the National Guard named below will assemble at Camp Lakeview, near Lake City, Minn., for an eight days' tour of duty and instruction as hereinafter designated.

First Infantry—Colonel Charles McC. Reeve, commanding, Monday, June 12, ending Monday, June 19.

Third Infantry—Colonel Charles A. Van Duzee, commanding, Tuesday, June 20, ending Tuesday, June 27.

Second Infantry—Colonel Arthur W. Wright, commanding, Thursday, July 6, ending Thursday, July 13.

First Battalion Artillery—Major George C. Lambert, commanding, Thursday, July 6, ending Thursday, July 13.

2. General headquarters will be stationed at Camp Lakeview from June 12 to June 27 inclusive, and from July 6 to July 13 inclusive, where all correspondence will be addressed, during the time mentioned.

3. The following named officers are ordered into service during the encampment of the several organizations of the National Guard, as stated in the preceding paragraph: Brigadier General Fred B. Wood, Adjutant General; Major Charles W. Fisher, assistant inspector general; Captain William H. Hatcher, military storekeeper; and Captain Orris E. Lee, brigade inspector of small arms practice. Major Fisher, Captain Hatcher and Captain Lee will report to the Adjutant General for duty in connection with their respective departments.

4. The Adjutant General will prepare the grounds and also procure and furnish the transportation and pay necessary to the execution of all orders.

5. No issue of ordnance or quartermaster's supplies will be made while in camp.

6. For purpose of instruction, regimental quartermasters and commissaries will make consolidated requisitions to these headquarters for supplies pertaining to their respective departments, while in camp.

7. The commanding officer of the First Artillery will send one gun to camp, in charge of three competent men, on the 12th day of June, 1905, together with the necessary ammunition for salute firing. This detachment will report to the commanding officer of the camp for the time being, and when not engaged in artillery duty will be ordered to report to Captain William H. Hatcher, military storekeeper, for work in his department.

8. The senior medical officer on duty with each regiment and with the battalion of artillery will, within ten days after the close of his tour of duty, make report in writing of his observations to the regimental commander, and also to the surgeon general, who with his remarks and conclusions endorsed thereon, will forward the same to these headquarters.

9. The taking of "substitutes" is strictly prohibited, and regimental commanders will prosecute violations of this provision.

10. The commanding officer of each regiment will assume general charge of the camp and be responsible for its appearance during the time his command shall occupy it, and leave the same in perfect sanitary condition.

11. Enlisted men are strictly prohibited from boarding or interfering with trains stopping at or passing through the camp grounds, unless provided with proper transportation. Regimental commanders will cause charges to be preferred against any members of their command who violate this order.

12. Driving nails in tent poles, defacing tent walls or other public property will not be tolerated. Officers and enlisted men occupying tents or using public property will be held responsible for the proper care thereof, and any damage thereto will be deducted from their per diem in camp.

13. Bands of the "Minnesota National Guard," when on duty with troops, will not play "Star Spangled Banner" as part of a medley. It will be played as a selection by itself.

14. In case of accidents or wounds, and in case of serious damage to property, the commanding officer of the camp will at once make report thereof direct to the Adjutant General. He will also, without further instructions, immediately convene a board of officers to ascertain and determine the injury or damage and to fix the responsibility, and forward the report of the board, with his conclusions thereon, as soon as practicable to the Adjutant General.

15. Company commanders will make daily reports to regimental headquarters immediately after the morning roll call, using the regular army morning books, and commanding officers at camp will render to these headquarters direct, a consolidated morning report of their command on each day.

16. Regimental commanders using blank ammunition in drill, will instruct their men to pick up empty shells and turn the same over to the ordnance officer.

17. A general report from each regimental commander and the surgeon general will be made to the Adjutant General within thirty days from the close of their encampment.

## GENERAL ORDERS NO. 9.

May 8, 1905.

1. The following act of the legislature (chapter 225, Laws 1905) is published for the information and government of all concerned:

AN ACT to amend the military code relative to the participation of the National Guard in army maneuvers, the purchase of military stores, the composition of summary courts and hospital corps, and the award of service decorations. Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. That section 17 of the military code, as amended, be, and the same is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 17. Regiments of Infantry; Bands—Each regiment of infantry shall consist of one colonel and one lieutenant colonel, one regimental surgeon with the rank of major, one regimental adjutant, one regimental quartermaster, one regimental commissary of subsistence, each with the rank of captain, two assistant surgeons, and one judge advocate, each with the rank of first lieutenant; one regimental sergeant major, one quartermaster sergeant, one commissary sergeant, two color sergeants, not less than two nor more than three battalions, one regimental band, and one hospital corps, to consist of one sergeant, first class, two sergeants, three corporals, and not to exceed twelve privates, first class. Each regimental band shall consist of one chief musician, one principal musician, one drum major, four sergeants, eight corporals, one cook and twelve privates."

Section 2. That section 20 of the military code, as amended, be, and the same is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 20. Battalion or Corps of Artillery—The battalion or corps of artillery shall consist of one major, one adjutant with the rank of captain, one quartermaster and commissary, one assistant surgeon, and one ordnance officer, each with the rank of first lieutenant, one sergeant major, one quartermaster sergeant, one commissary sergeant, one chief trumpeter, two batteries of artillery, one company of engineers, and one hospital corps, to consist of one sergeant, first class, one sergeant, one corporal, and not to exceed four privates, first class."

Section 3. That section 35 of the military code be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 35. Field Officers' Courts—The officers second in rank present for duty with each regiment of infantry or battalion of artillery or such other field staff or line officer as may be designated by the regimental commander, shall constitute the field officers' court for the trial of enlisted men in such regiment or battalion."

Section 4. That section 105 of the military code be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding thereto the following:

"The commander-in-chief may also provide for the participation of the National Guard, or any portion thereof, in encampments or field maneuvers at such places as may be designated by the war department pursuant to any act of congress; and in such case the officers and enlisted men attending the same shall receive, in addition to the pay and subsistence provided by the federal laws and regulations, the difference between such federal pay and state pay as provided by the military code for active service. Whenever the entire military forces of the state participate in such maneuvers, the same shall be mobilized at the state encampment grounds, Lake City, except that portion of said troops as may be stationed on the way to the place of maneuvers."

Section 5. That section 124 of the military code be, and the same is, hereby amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 124. Purchase of Uniforms—The commander-in-chief, the Adjutant General and the brigade commander are hereby appointed commissioners for the purpose of purchasing the clothing which may be necessary for the uniforming of the National Guard.

"All proposals for the furnishing of clothing, except when purchased from the United States government, shall be publicly advertised in one or more newspapers printed and published at the capitol of the state, and all bids shall be accompanied by sample of the articles to be furnished. Before such uniforms are accepted, they shall be inspected under the direction of the Adjutant General and vouchers for the payment of the same shall be approved by him. Ordnance and other stores shall be purchased by the Adjutant General as the necessities of the service may require."

Section 6. That section 140 of the military code, as amended, be and the same is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 140. Roll of Retired Officers—Any commissioned officer of the National Guard who has served or shall have served as such officer for a period of not less than ten years, and any commissioned officer of the National Guard who has been honorably discharged from the army of the United States after serving therein for a period of ninety days or more during the war of the Rebellion or during the war with Spain, and who shall have served as such officer of the National Guard for a period of not less than five years, and any commissioned officer of the National Guard who has become, or who shall hereafter become disabled and thereby incapable of performing the duties of his office, may, upon his own request in writing, stating the grounds therefor, and by order of the commander-in-chief, be withdrawn from active service and have his name placed on a roll in the office of the Adjutant General, to be known as the 'Roll of Retired Officers,' and shall thereby be entitled to wear, on state or other occasions of ceremony, the uniform of the rank last held by him.

"The commander-in-chief may, by general order, provide a suitable mark of distinction for all officers and enlisted men who have served in the National Guard for an aggregate period of ten, fifteen and twenty years, respectively, and for like service hereafter."

Section 7. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Approved April 17, 1905.

2. Under the provisions of sections 17 and 20 of the military code, as amended by chapter 225, Laws of 1905, regimental commanders and the commander of the battalion of artillery will take immediate steps to organize the hospital corps of their respective commands.

To the citizen soldier it is a constant declaration that the men fought and died "For Country and Country's Flag" are not to be forgotten, convincing proof that the National Guard is an important factor of the Nation's strength in time of trouble, and an incentive of the highest type of loyalty and soldierly conduct.

2. In recognition of the ceremonies of Memorial Day, permission is hereby granted organizations of the Minnesota National Guard to parade under arms on May 30, 1905. In accordance with United States army regulations, the National flag will be displayed on that date on all armories at half-staff from sunrise to mid-day. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and will remain there until sunset.

The following communication from the military secretary, war department, Washington, D. C., is published for the information of all concerned:

"WAR DEPARTMENT, THE MILITARY SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

"Washington, April 21, 1905.

"The Governor of Minnesota, St. Paul, Minn.

"Sir: I am instructed by the secretary of war to request that you forward to this office, for the consideration of the department, as soon as practicable, and not later than June 1, next, the names of such officers of the organized militia of your state as you may recommend for admission to the army service schools for the coming term, under the provisions of section 16 of the militia act of January 21, 1903.

"The schools to which it will be practicable to admit officers of the militia this year are:

"The Army Medical School, Washington.

"The Infantry and Cavalry School, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

"The Artillery School, Fort Monroe, Virginia.

"And garrison schools at the posts designated in war department circular No. 26, June 28, 1904,—copy herewith.

"The regulations prescribed by the president to govern the admission of militia officers as published in war department general orders No. 115, of last year, will soon be republished with some minor modifications for the information of all concerned. The requirements in the present regulations as to eligibility for admission are retained. These requirements are that the applicant shall have

been a member of the organized militia for at least one year; that he shall be between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-five years (except for admission to the Army Medical School), and a citizen of the United States; and that he shall furnish his affidavit covering these points and a certificate from the colonel of his regiment or other person or persons that he is of good moral character, etc.

"Early action is necessary, as it is essential that all the preliminary requirements be met and the eligible applicants be prepared to enter the schools at the commencement of the courses of instruction in order that they may be entitled to the allowances, etc., provided by law for those who complete the full course.

## GENERAL ORDERS NO. 14.

June 3, 1905.

1. The following regulations relative to the conduct of small arms practice by the Minnesota National Guard, are hereby established and published for the information of all concerned:

2. The season for record practice, 1905, will be considered as having commenced April 15 last, and will close October 31 next. All reports required will be rendered within ten days after the close of the target season.

3. The firing regulations for small arms practice, 1904, promulgated by the secretary of war, will govern in all work. Preliminary drills, gallery and instruction practice must, as far as possible, be held at home station of troops, in order that the limited time available in camp can be used fully for the record practice prescribed in special course "C," S. A. F. R., for the organized militia of the United States.

4. Record practice on state rifle range under the supervision of the brigade inspector of small arms practice, will commence on the morning following the arrival of troops in camp, and be continued until completed, under the direction of regimental commanders, who will detail competent clerical help to assist the inspector of small arms practice in his duties. All range work should, so far as practicable, be carried on by battalion, the battalion commander acting as range officer, making all necessary details from his command, complying so far as applicable with S. A. F. R., especially chapter 1, paragraph 4, thereof. The range officer will procure the necessary ammunition, daily from the military storekeeper, and will be held responsible for the return each day to the military storekeeper of all empty shells resulting from the day's practice.

5. Each company commander in going into camp will cause to be made upon blanks to be furnished, a complete list of all members of his company in camp, and deliver the same to the brigade inspector of small arms practice, who will cause to be issued the necessary score cards to the men entitled to practice. Upon presentation of these cards, the necessary ammunition will be issued.

6. When the soldier is called to the firing point, he will deliver his score card to the scorer, and upon completion of his score will turn over to him the empty shells before receiving his copy of the score.

7. Scorer will write on score cards the return of all shells, and no new score cards for future practice will be issued until the previous card is returned, showing expenditure of ammunition and return of shells. After scores are completed the executive officer will deliver the same to the brigade inspector of small arms practice for entry and compilation.

8. All questions of construction of orders and regulations of small arms practice will be determined by the brigade inspector of small arms practice.

9. Regimental commanders are authorized to institute company team matches, teams to consist of seven (7) men from each company, who will be allowed ten shots each at 200, 300 and 500 yard ranges, to select from these competitors and publish at the close of the encampment the names of the members of their regimental teams who will take part in the annual state match.

10. The above rules will apply as far as practicable to the company of engineers, First Artillery, who will engage in target practice at such time as may be agreed upon by the commanding officer of the First Artillery and the brigade inspector of small arms practice.

11. Each company of infantry and engineers are authorized to require during the season of 1905 and annually thereafter, until otherwise ordered, 3,000 rounds of ball cartridges and such range supplies as can be spared, to be expended and used on home ranges. Upon report of proper expenditure of these cartridges, an additional 2,000 rounds per company will be issued. The monthly report of companies will show amount of ammunition on hand and amount expended during the month. All empty shells from firing on company ranges must be decapped, cleaned and turned in to the military storekeeper, St. Paul, before December 31, each year.

12. Qualifying scores made on home ranges during the target season, in accordance with existing regulations, if certified by a commissioned officer may be reported to the brigade inspector of small arms practice, and will be considered in determining and fixing the figure of merit of a company.
