CIRCULAR NO. 1.

May 1, 1905.

The attention of commanding officers is called to the following, which must be strictly adhered to:

"WAR DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF ORDNANCE.

"Washington, March 28, 1905.

"1. Referring to paragraph 3, section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended, with reference to the issue of arms and equipments to the militia which directs the secretary of war to make such regulations as he may deem necessary to protect the interests of the United States, attention is invited to the provisions of paragraphs 283, 284 and 285, army regulations of 1904, which pertain to the care of arms and equipments, and which should be enforced by the governors of the different states and territories and by the commanding general of the militia of the District of Columbia as being necessary for preserving the material in condition for use upon necessity, which is the object of their supply by the general government.

"2. It will be noted that these paragraphs prohibit:

"(a) The taking apart of arms by enlisted men except by permission of a commissioned officer, and then only under proper supervision and in the manner described in the descriptive pamphlet of the arm, issued by the ordnance department.

"(b) The polishing of blued or browned parts, the rebluing or rebrowning of such parts, or the putting of any portion of an arm in fire.

"(c) The removing of a barrel from a receiver.

"(d) The mutilation of any part by filing or otherwise, and beautifying or changing the finish.

"(e) The use of any dressing or polishing material on leather accoutrements, equipments, harness, etc., except the preparations supplied or approved by the ordnance department.

"(f) All changes in equipments except the adjustments provided for in their construction for fitting them to soldiers.

"3. It should be noted that paragraph 283, army regulations, 1904, makes obligatory a strict compliance with the rules for dismounting and assembling the arms by soldiers, for cleaning and care of the arm, and for repairing arms in the hands of troops, contained in the descriptive pamphlet issued by the ordnance department.

"4. As the arms and equipments in the possession of the militia form a large part of the entire supply of the United States, and as only a strict observance of the provisions of the above mentioned paragraphs can ensure such material being in a serviceable condition in case of emergency, the necessity for their enforcement is apparent.

"5. Should defects be discovered in arms, accoutrements or equipments, a report describing in detail the nature and extent thereof should be submitted to the chief of ordnance, United States army, and only those remedial measures taken that shall be authorized or prescribed by that officer. Broken parts of arms, etc., should not be turned into this department for any purpose by officers of the militia direct, but, under proper authority, by the governor or Adjutant General of the state or territory to which the arms, etc., are issued. When broken bolts or other parts of the United States arms are turned into this department, because of unusual breakage, as full information of the circumstances of the breakage as possible should be forwarded. Care should be taken in such cases to preserve the broken surfaces from rust.

"6. Attention is invited to the laws which provide for the issue of material for arming and equipping the militia in the several states, territories and District of Columbia. No part of the arms and equipments so issued should be turned over by the authorities of any state, or territory, or the District of Columbia to private individuals, educational institutions, independent military organizations, societies, corporations, or other organizations not a part of the organized militia.

CIRCULAR NO. 2.

May 16, 1905.

The use of the blanket tag by the National Guard of the state is hereby discontinued, and it will be replaced by the "blanket roll."

To insure uniformity, the following description of the blanket roll and instructions how to pack it, are published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

BLANKET ROLL.

The following articles together with the overcoat are usually packed in the blanket roll by troops in active service:

One flannel shirt, one undershirt, one pair drawers, two pair socks, one towel, piece of soap, comb, hair brush, tooth brush, five shelter tent pegs, two shelter tent poles.

The roll is packed as follows:

Each man with his shelter half smoothly spread on the ground, with buttons up and triangular end to the front, folds his blanket once across its length and places it upon the shelter half; fold toward the bottom edge one-half inch from the square end, the same amount of canvas uncovered at the top and bottom. He then places the parts of the pole on the side of the blanket next the square end of the shelter half, near and parallel to the fold, end of pole about six inches from the edge of the blanket; nests the pins similarly near the opposite edge of the blanket and distributes the other articles carried in the roll; folds the triangular end and the exposed portion of the bottom of the shelter half over the blanket.

The two men in each file roll and fasten first the roll of the front and then of the rear rank man. The file closers work similarly, two and two. Each pair stands on the folded side, rolls the blanket roll closely and buckles the straps, passing the end of the strap through both keeper and buckle, back over the buckle and under the keeper. With the roll so lying on the ground that the edge of the shelter half can just be seen when looking vertically downward, one end is bent upward and over beneath the other, a close hitch is taken with the guy rope, first around the end to which it is attached and then around the other end, adjusting the length of rope between hitches to suit the wearer.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 1.

January 2, 1906.

Under the provisions of section 14 of the military code of Minnesota, as amended, the following changes in the organization of the Minnesota National Guard are hereby made in order to conform more closely to the number and grade of officers allowed by law to similar organizations in the army of the United States:

To be added to the brigade staff (section 16, military code), one surgeon with the rank of major.

To be added to each battalion of infantry (section 18, military code), one battalion quartermaster and commissary with the rank of second lieutenant.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 2.

January 27, 1906.

The following amendments to paragraphs 333 and 441 of the United States Army Regulations, 1904, are published for the information and guidance of the Minnesota National Guard, and the requirements of the drill regulations are modified accordingly:

"333—Whenever 'The Star Spangled Banner' is played by the band on a formal occasion at a military station, or at any place where persons belonging to the military service are present in their official capacity, all officers and enlisted men present will stand at attention, and if not in ranks will 'salute with the right hand,' the position of the salute being retained until the last note of 'The Star Spangled Banner'. If not in ranks and armed, the rifle salute or saber salute will be used. If in ranks, the commanding officer only will salute. The same respect will be observed towards the national air of any other country when it is played as a compliment to official representatives of such country. Whenever 'The Star Spangled Banner' is played, as contemplated by this paragraph, the air will be played through once without the repetition of any part, except such repetition as is called for by the musical score."

"441—At every military post or station the flag will be hoisted at the sounding of the first note of the reveille, or of the first note of the march, if a march be played before the reveille. The flag will be lowered at the sounding of the last note of retreat, and while the flag is being lowered the band will play 'The Star Spangled Banner', or, if there be no band present, the field music will sound 'To the Color'. When 'To the Color' is sounded by the field music while the flag is being lowered, the same respect will be observed as when 'The Star Spangled Banner' is played by the band. The national flag shall be displayed at a sea coast or lake fort at the commencement of an action and during a battle in which the fort may be engaged, whether by day or night."

2. To avoid inconvenience and expense incident to the assembling of brigade staff, regimental field, staff, N. C. staff and hospital corps at their respective headquarters, they are authorized to report to the inspecting officer at the company station nearest their homes on the dates set for the inspection there. 3. The annual inspection of the Minnesota National Guard, prescribed by section 103, M. C., and of all public property and funds in hands of troops, will also be made at the time and place specified above for the war department inspection, by Lieutenant-Colonel William Gerlach, inspector (section 12, M. C.).

5. Only one copy of last annual property return need be prepared and handed to the inspecting officer, with memorandum showing changes, if any, to date of inspection. GENERAL ORDERS NO. 9.

May 1, 1906.

1. The following regulations relative to the conducting of small arms practice by the Minnesota National Guard, are hereby established and published for the information of all concerned.

2. The current season for rifle practice will open May 1, 1906, and close October 31st, next.

3. Practice with the United States magazine rifle, cal. .30, will be required of every officer and enlisted man in the infantry arm of the service and company of engineers, except regimental bands and hospital corps. Members of regimental bands and hospital corps will be permitted to qualify with the United States magazine rifle, and to those qualifying decorations will be issued.

4. Company officers should become proficient in the use of the rifle themselves so that they can impart instructions to the enlisted men, and will see that every man in their command is thoroughly instructed in the use and care of the rifle, and that no man be permitted to go upon the range until he understands the mechanism of his rifle and is competent to care for and use it properly. Men

must not be permitted to go upon the range for practice until they have been properly instructed in sighting, position and aiming drills; using the methods and rules prescribed in the new firing regulations of the United States army, so far as they apply. It is extremely dangerous to have un instructed men fire over the range, and officers permitting such men to go upon the range will be held to a strict accountability.

5. Officers in charge of a range will see that it is properly equipped, that proper protection is provided for the men and the markers at the butts, and that every possible protection is taken to prevent accidents; they will also verify the distances and see that the firing points are accurately and distinctly marked.

6. Classification—The class in firing to which any officer or soldier belongs will be determined at the end of the practice season from the aggregate of the total of the best two full scores of five shots each (scores not necessarily consecutive), that he has made on the range, as follows:

Fourth Class—All who have not fired or practiced. All who having fired or practiced have failed to qualify as third classmen.

Third Class—All who practice, and who in two scores of five shots each at 200 yards, exclusive of sighting shots, score at least 15 out of a possible 50, and who after making 15 or more, at 200 yards, shall in two scores of five shots each at 300 yards, and two scores of five shots each at 500 yards, make enough in addition to the score of 15 or more at 200 yards, to make an aggregate of 45 out of a possible 150, at the three ranges.

(The making of 15 at the 200 yard range is obligatory.)

Second Class—All who have fired two or more scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 67 out of a possible 150.

First Class—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 83 out of a possible 150.

Marksmen—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 98 out of a possible 150.

Sharpshooters—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards and from the best two on each range have made a total of 160; and have fired two or more full scores, timed fire, at 200 yards (30 second firing intervals in each score), and in the best two have made a total of 25; and have made one skirmish run of 20 shots advancing from 600 to 200 yards; the total of all scores being not less than 235.

(No man can qualify as a sharpshooter until he has first made a score of at least 120 as a marksman, and in qualifying as a sharpshooter he must make a score of at least 40 in slow fire at 600 yards, and a score of at least 25 in timed firing at 200 yards. There is no fixed score for the skirmish run, but the points made in the skirmish run added to the score previously made, at all ranges, must aggregate at least 235.)

Experts—All who have made the necessary total to qualify as sharpshooter, and have fired two or more full scores at 300 and 1,000 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 40 at 800, and 35 at 1,000 yards.

7. Records and Returns—Score sheets will be issued from the Adjutant General's office direct. Every score shot, to be considered and computed in arranging classification, must be recorded on a score sheet, giving full name and rank of officer or enlisted man and date on which score was made must be retained by the commanding officer until the close of the rifle practice season, and must be entered in a blotter or scratch record book to be provided by the commanding officer. In the blotter or scratch book must be entered every shot fired over the home range by members of the company, giving name, distance shot and date of practice. At the close of the season the qualifying score will be selected from the scores made and filed during the season, and score sheets of the scores that make up the qualifying score will be forwarded to the brigade inspector of small arms practice and the qualifying score only will be entered in the company record book. The company record book must be promptly written up at close of season.

Scores shot on the 200, 300 and 500 yard ranges must be signed by a commissioned or non-commissioned officer, who witnessed the score, and knew it to be made in accordance with existing regulations. If such score is certified to by a non-commissioned officer, it must be approved by an officer before being forwarded.

Scores shot on the 600 yard range must be signed by an officer who witnessed the shooting and certifies to correctness of score. The firing at the 800 and 1,000 yard range will be conducted by an officer and in accordance with regulations governing qualifications. Only ink or indelible pencil will be used in filling up and signing score sheets.

Company commanders must forward their returns within fifteen days after the close of the season. These returns must also be certified to as required by the blank form.

The following requirements must be strictly adhered to in making up return of scores:

(a) Every officer and enlisted man who has been or is a member of the company during the small arms practice season, whether he qualified, or practiced but failed to qualify, or did not practice, must be accounted for.

The aggregate of each string of five shots in a qualifying score, except the skirmish run, must be given, as indicated by the blank form. Where men have practiced and failed to hit the target, the figure naught (0) will be used. Where men failed to practice nothing should be inserted in the space for score, but in the column of remarks it should be stated "failed to practice."

(b) Where men are transferred from one command to another or from a company to headquarters, such men will only be accounted for classified, and be

calculated on the figure of merit in the command in which they are serving at the close of the season, and in column of remarks it should be shown from what command they were transferred. The names of all men lost by transfer during the small arms practice season will be reported under a separate heading on the return of scores. In column of remarks, date of transfer should be given, and to what command.

(c) Where commissions of officers or enlistment of men expire during the small arms practice season, it should be noted in column of remarks, and in event of an officer being recommissioned, or an enlisted man re-enlisting, that fact should be stated.

8. Ammunition—For the season of 1906 the maximum ammunition for target practice to be issued to each company of infantry and company of engineers, for use on the home range, will be 7,000 rounds; 4,000 before the encampment period and 3,000 afterwards. All empty shells from firing on company ranges must be decapped, cleaned and turned in to the military storekeeper, St. Paul, within thirty days after the close of the season.

9. Camp Range—Record practice on the state rifle range under the supervision of the brigade inspector of small arms practice, will commence on the morning following the arrival of troops in camp, and be continued until completed under the direction of regimental commanders, who will detail competent clerical help to assist the inspector of small arms practice in his duties. All range work should, so far as possible, be carried on by battalion; the battalion commander acting as range officer, making all necessary details from his command. The range officers will procure all necessary ammunition daily from the military storekeeper, and will be held responsible for the return each day to the military storekeeper, of all empty shells resulting from the day's practice.

Each company commander upon his arrival in camp will cause to be made upon blanks to be furnished, a complete list of all members of his company in camp, and deliver the same to the brigade inspector of small arms practice, who will cause to be issued the necessary score cards to the men entitled to practice. Upon presentation of these cards, the necessary ammunition will be issued.

When the soldier is called to the firing point he will deliver his score card to the scorer, and upon completion of his score will turn over to him the empty shells before receiving his copy of the score. The scorer will write on the score card the return of all shells, and no new score cards for future practice will be issued until the previous card is returned, showing expenditure of ammunition and return of shells. After scores are completed, the executive officer will deliver the same to the brigade inspector of small arms practice for entry and compilation. All questions of construction of orders and regulations of small arms practice will be determined by the brigade inspector of small arms practice.

Regimental commanders are authorized to institute company team matches, teams to consist of seven (7) men from each company, who will be allowed ten shots each at 200, 300 and 500 yard ranges, and to select and publish at the close of the encampment the names of all members of their regimental teams who will take part in the annual state match.

The above rules will apply, so far as practicable, to the company of engineers, First Artillery, which will engage in target practice, at such time as may be agreed upon by the commanding officer of the First Artillery, and the brigade inspector of small arms practice.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 10.

May 1, 1906.

1. The organizations of the National Guard named below will assemble at Camp Lakeview, near Lake City, Minn., for a ten days' tour of duty and instruction as hereinafter designated.

Second Infantry—Colonel Arthur W. Wright commanding, Friday, June 15th, ending Sunday, June 24th.

First Infantry—Colonel Charles McC. Reeve commanding, Monday, July 16th, ending Wednesday, July 25th.

Third Infantry—Colonel Charles A. Van Duzee commanding, and First Battalion of Artillery, Major George C. Lambert commanding, Monday, July 23d, ending Wednesday, August 1st, of which six days will be devoted to practice march and four days at Camp Lakeview.

2. Brigadier General Fred B. Wood, Adjutant General, is charged with the execution of this order, and for this purpose will, accompanied by general headquarters, proceed to and remain at Camp Lakeview while troops are in camp. All official correspondence should be addressed to Camp Lakeview.

3. The following named officers are ordered into service during the encampment and practice marches of the several organizations of the National Guard, as stated in paragraph 1.

Brigadier General Fred B. Wood, Adjutant General and disbursing officer; Major Charles W. Fisher, assistant inspector general; Major Edward W. Bird, assistant judge advocate general; Captain William H. Hatcher, military storekeeper; Captain Orris E. Lee, brigade inspector of small arms practice; and Lieutenant Arthur E. Clark, Jr., assistant brigade inspector of small arms practice. Major Fisher, Major Bird, Captain Hatcher, Captain Lee, and Lieutenant Clark will report to the Adjutant General for duty in connection with their respective departments.

4. The Adjutant General will prepare the grounds and also procure and furnish the transportation and pay necessary to the execution of all orders.

5. For purpose of instruction, regimental quartermasters and commissaries will make consolidated requisitions to these headquarters for supplies pertaining to their respective departments, while in camp.

6. The commanding officer of the First Artillery will send one gun to camp, in charge of three competent men, on the 12th day of June, 1906, together with the necessary ammunition for salute firing. This detachment will report to the commanding officer of the camp for the time being, and when not engaged in artillery duty will be ordered to report to Captain William H. Hatcher, military storekeeper, for work in his department.

7. The senior medical officer on duty with each regiment and with the battalion of artillery will, within ten days after the close of his tour of duty, make report in writing of his observations to the regimental commander, and also to the surgeon general, who with his remarks and conclusions endorsed thereon, will forward the same to these headquarters.

8. The taking of "substitutes" is strictly prohibited, and regimental commanders will prosecute violations of this provision.

9. The commanding officer of each regiment will assume general charge of the camp and be responsible for its appearance during the time his command shall occupy it, and leave the same in perfect sanitary condition.

10. Enlisted men are strictly prohibited from boarding or interfering with trains stopping at or passing through the camp grounds, unless provided with proper transportation. Regimental commanders will cause charges to be preferred against any members of their command who violate this order.

11. Driving nails in tent poles, defacing tent walls or other public property, will not be tolerated. Officers and enlisted men occupying tents or using public property will be held responsible for the proper care thereof, and any damage thereto will be deducted from their per diem in camp.

12. Bands of the Minnesota National Guard, when on duty with troops, will not play "Star Spangled Banner" as part of a medley. It will be played only as a selection by itself.

13. In case of accidents or wounds, and in case of serious damage to property, the commanding officer of the camp will at once make report thereof direct to the Adjutant General. He will also, without further instructions, immediately convene a board of officers to ascertain and determine the injury or damage and to fix the responsibility, and forward the report of the board, with his conclusions thereon, as soon as practicable to the Adjutant General.

14. Company commanders will make daily reports to regimental headquarters immediately after the morning roll call, using the regular army morning report books, and commanding officers at camp will render to these headquarters direct, a consolidated morning report of their command on each day.

15. Regimental commanders using blank ammunition in drill, will instruct their men to pick up empty shells and turn the same over to the ordnance officer.

16. A general report from each regimental commander and the surgeon general will be made to the Adjutant General within thirty days from the close of their encampment.

Wood, Adjutant General, will proceed to Camp Lakeview from these headquarters in time to personally supervise the work ordered in paragraph 1, and in connection with the selection and practice of a rifle team to represent the state of Minnesota in the rifle matches at Sea Girt, N. J.

3. The first day will be devoted to preliminary practice by the regimental and company teams.

4. The forenoon of the second day will be devoted to the company team match and the afternoon to the beginning of the regimental team match, which will be completed as soon as practicable.

5. Upon completion of the regimental match, team captains will each, in addition to themselves, designate seven men of their teams, the brigadier inspector of small arms practice will designate three men, and the commander of the battalion of artillery one man, to compete for places on the state team, to consist of twelve men and three alternates to be selected by the brigade inspector of small arms practice, from those making the highest scores during said competition.

6. Upon completion of the regular contests, the 800 and 1,000 yard ranges will be opened to all present who have qualified as sharpshooters but not as experts during the present season, and they will be permitted to fire four scores at those distances with a view of qualifying as experts.

7. The company team match will be the marksman's course, under special course "C," United States firing regulations; the regimental team match will be the sharpshooter's course, and the contest for places on the state team will be the expert riflemen's course, under the said special course "C."

8. Major Edward W. Bird, assistant judge advocate general, M. N. G.; Captain Orris E. Lee, brigade inspector of small arms practice; Captain William H. Hart, brigade quartermaster; Captain William H. Hatcher, military storekeeper, M. N. G.; and First Lieutenant Arthur E.
