

"Americans and Canadians within the age limits aforesaid who desire to enter the military service of their own country must enlist or enroll or must leave Canada or the United States, as the case may be, for the purpose of military service in their own country before the expiration of 60 days after the date of the exchange of ratifications of this convention, if liable to military service in the country in which they are at the said date; or if not so liable, then before the expiration of 30 days after the time when liability shall accrue; or, as to those holding certificates of exemption under Article III of this convention, before the expiration of 30 days after the date on which any such certificate becomes inoperative unless sooner renewed; or as to those who apply for certificates of exemption under Article III, and whose applications are refused, then before the expiration of 30 days after the date of such refusal, unless the application be sooner granted.

"The Government of the United States, through the consul general at Ottawa, and His Britannic Majesty's Government through the British ambassador at Washington, may issue certificates of exemption from military service to Americans and Canadians, respectively, upon application or otherwise, within 60 days from the date of the exchange of ratifications of this convention or within 30 days from the date when such citizens or subjects become liable to military service in accordance with Article I, provided that the applications be made or the certificates be granted prior to their entry into the military service of either country. Such certificates may be special or general, temporary or conditional, and may be modified, renewed, or revoked in the discretion of the Government granting them. Persons holding such certificates shall, so long as the certificates are in force, not be liable to military service in the country in which they are.

"The Government of the United States and the Government of Canada will, respectively, so far as possible facilitate the return of Canadians and Americans who may desire to return to their own country for military service, but shall not be responsible for providing transport or the cost of transport for such persons.

"No citizen or subject of either country who, under the provisions of this convention, enters the military service of the other shall, by reason of such service be considered, after this convention shall have expired or after his discharge, to have lost his nationality or to be under any allegiance to the United States or to His Britannic Majesty, as the case may be.

"The present convention shall be ratified by the President of the United States of America, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate of the United States, and by His Britannic Majesty, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Washington or at London as soon as possible. It shall come into operation on the date on which the ratifications are exchanged and shall remain in force until the expiration of 60 days after either of the contracting parties shall have given notice of termination to the other; whereupon any citizen or subject of either country incorporated into the military service of the other under this convention shall be as soon as possible discharged therefrom.

"In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the present convention and have affixed thereto their seals.

"Done in duplicate at Washington the third day of June, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and eighteen."

In direct contrast to the draft agreement between Great Britain, Canada and the United States, a movement was begun in Washington in December, 1917, by diplomatic representatives of neutral countries to forbid drafting into military service of any subjects of such neutral countries.

This controversy assumed international proportions and resulted in the interchange of countless diplomatic notes. Subjects of countries contiguous to the Central Powers were the ones who made the most strenuous objection to entering the military service of the United States. In innumerable cases in Minnesota alone registrants of these neutral nationalities fought against induction into military service by every means in their power.

At this stage of the draft a subject of a neutral country could claim deferred classification on that account and by this means evade the obligations imposed upon them by residence in the country in which they had materially prospered. The problem was one which demanded a settlement which would be acceptable to the men in uniform who had given up home, family, business, and everything that they held dear, to offer their lives in an incidental protection of these few slackers of neutral citizenship.

A settlement was made at a later date which stipulated that subjects of a neutral country who had made application for American citizenship and who did not desire to undertake the military obligations of such citizenship could, in their discretion, renounce all present and future claim to such citizenship in the United States and be placed in Class 5 of the draft.

"Keeping Fit to Fight" Plea Made to Draftees.

The wide diversity of men placed into military service by the draft necessitated some means of instruction along moral lines. A pamphlet titled "Keeping Fit to Fight" was distributed by the Minnesota Commission of Public Safety to every drafted man. This pamphlet contained a frank discussion of problems in sexual hygiene, written in terms readily understood by all. The problem was dealt with not on a religious or moral plane, but the argument was based on purely patriotic reasons. It was a frank, man-to-man appeal to keep fit to fight in order that the individual might not clog the fighting machinery as a whole. Each drafted man was given one of these pamphlets before entrainment for camp and he was requested to read carefully, digest and heed its contents.

Physical Standards Lowered in Height and Weight.

Physical examination regulations governing the acceptance of registrants for military service were amended on July 19, 1918, to make 60 inches the minimum height for acceptance instead of 63 inches, and the minimum weight 110 pounds. All registrants who had been previously rejected for height or weight deficiencies and who were within the new regulations were recalled by their local board for another examination, and if found acceptable were passed and made liable for military service.

As a result of this change there was wild rejoicing on the part of these "bantams." As one of these registrants said, when notified that he was passed for service, "I may be small, but what there is of me is concentrated fight."

Instruction Boards Appointed for Draftees.

"Boards of instruction" were appointed at about this time to purvey to draft registrants such information as "Why the United States entered the war; what it was fighting for," and other information tending to explain the reasons for the necessity of obliterating the military power of Germany.

These boards of instruction were composed of men whose personality would have a telling effect on the registered men with whom they came in contact. Their duties consisted in disseminating this aforementioned information through the medium of speeches and by personal contact with the individual registrant.

The first of a series of addresses authorized by General Crowder, to be delivered to registered men in Class 1, was distributed under date of July 10, 1918. In this address an explanation was given of the reason for the selection of the individual for service in the army, the necessity for suppressing enemy propaganda at home, and concluded with this appeal: "This is your war. You are going to win it by what you are—good Americans and good soldiers. You are good Americans already. It will take some time to make good soldiers out of you. The sooner you start, the sooner you will arrive. Begin now."

A telegram specifying the urgent necessity of giving deferred classification in the cases of county agricultural agents employed by the Department of Agriculture was sent by General Crowder to the Adjutant General's office July 24, 1918. It urged that special consideration be given to certificates issued by the Department of Agriculture to county agents when the draft board considered the request for deferred classification.

The telegram read, in part, as follows: "The Department of Agriculture is charged by Congress with the duty of stimulating economical food production along all lines. The extension machinery is the most valuable single agency for this purpose. It is difficult to secure men with the requisite vision and leadership. Institutions have not been training them for long enough time to permit the department to man the force entirely by men over draft age."

The status of professional baseball players following the promulgation of the "work or fight" order was such that considerable pressure was brought to bear on the Federal draft authorities in Washington to extend the time limit in order that the 1918 baseball season might be played out. The requested extension of time from July 1 to September 1, 1918, was authorized by President Wilson on July 27, 1918. Authority was later given the contesting teams to play off the so-called "world's championship."

Considerable dissatisfaction to both registrants and military authorities was caused by lack of unification in physical examination standards. Registrants examined and passed as physically fit by the local board surgeon would be examined and rejected as physically unfit by army surgeons at the camp to which the registrants were sent. This resulted in unwarranted loss of time to the registrant, as well as a considerable expense to the Federal government.

Two changes had already been made in physical examination regulations up to this time in an endeavor to unify physical examinations given by draft board surgeons and army camp surgeons. On August 7, 1918, a telegram from General Crowder insisted that "Rejections of registrants at camps have recently reached inexcusably high figures. It is evident that many local boards have forwarded unfit men whose defects were readily recognizable."

In order to insure a thoroughly efficient physical examination of all Minnesota draftees in the August call, a re-examination of all doubtful cases was ordered by the Adjutant General's office. Parenthetically, it may be said that this re-examination did not disclose any cases where registrants were unfit physically.

Under the original draft system members of draft boards between the ages of 21 to 31 years were required to be replaced by others over 31 years of age. When the age limit was changed to 18 to 45 years, inclusive, it was necessary, in order to avoid absolute disruption of the existing draft machinery, to make provision for draft board members within the new ages.

Federal draft authorities, realizing the intricate and technical character of the work demanded of draft board members, and also realizing the impossibility of training other men in as short a space of time as was available, ruled that deferred classification be granted. The deferred classification was given "on the ground of necessary employment in the service of the United States," and was authorized to be given to draft board members and Government appeal agents within the new draft age limits.

The work demanded of the draft board members was, and is, of such an intricate nature that it requires a professional man's acumen, combined with unflinching tact and an abundance of good nature. A combination of these essentials is rarely discovered in one individual, and when it is remembered that in Minnesota alone there are 121 local boards having a board membership of from three to eight men, together with five district boards, it will be readily seen of what importance the granting of deferred classification of these men meant to an efficient continuance of the draft.

Age Limit

The legislation necessary in increasing the age limit of the selective service from 21 years to 31 years of age, to from 18 years to 45 years, inclusive, was approved by the President on August 31, 1918.

This legislation will undoubtedly be regarded by historians as one of the most important bills ever passed by the legislative houses. It made available for military service practically the entire man power of the United States. It was perhaps the most conclusive demonstration of the whole-souled interest with which this country regarded the prosecution of the war.

In the opinion of the Adjutant General this legislation marks the beginning of a new epoch of citizenship obligation. Prior to the operation of the Selective Service the archaic, mediæval volunteer method of supplying man power for the military was in vogue. This system was not democratic. It threw the burden of defense of citizenship rights on the shoulders of a few intensely patriotic citizens. It nullified necessary industrial production at home because it took from the lathe the machinist; it took from his retorts the chemist; it took from his workshop the inventor; and wasted their energies which could be otherwise better put to use.

Deferred classification for necessary industrial employes was one of the basic principles of the selective service questionnaire method. It was early realized that a war of the tremendous proportions of that which the United States was engaged could not be properly conducted without production at home being kept at the highest stage of efficiency. In addition to production, transportation of the finished product to points where they were needed, was considered just as essential. This, of course, meant that necessary railroad employes should receive deferred classification. Department managers of the various railroads were requested to claim such deferred classification for their employes who could not readily be replaced.

In order to avoid crippling rail transportation, General Crowder, on August 14, 1918, ordered that "application for reconsideration of cases of railroad employes on industrial grounds, when presented to local boards, should be received up to the day and hour of induction into military service and properly forwarded, together with the local board's recommendation, to the district board having jurisdiction; district boards may directly receive applications for reconsideration in cases over which they have original jurisdiction, and immediately request from the proper local board the entire record of the case, and these applications may be received up to the day and hour of induction into military service; even though a registrant employed in railroad work has not claimed deferral on industrial grounds, his employers may make that claim, either through the local board or direct to the district board, at any time up to the day and hour of induction, and the district board may grant the deferred classification."

The industries stipulated in this order as essential and entitled to deferred classification include "machinists, blacksmiths, boiler makers, tin and copper smiths, pipefitters, helpers and apprentices of foregoing, hostlers and engine house men, train dispatchers and directors, telegraphers, telephoners and block operators, telegraph clerks, yardmasters and assistants, locomotive engineers and motormen, locomotive firemen and helpers, conductors, yard foremen, and brakemen and section foremen."

Due to long continued calls of the government for trained stenographers, typists and bookkeepers, it was almost impossible for draft boards to secure and retain sufficient clerical help. The situation was rapidly taking on a serious aspect. Repeated calls by the Government for men to be sent to the camps, requests for detailed information and reports, were being made in such number that efficient clerical assistance was necessary. Reports on this situation were made to General Crowder and on August 19, 1918, permission was given for the induction into military service of limited service men otherwise qualified as stenographers, typists, clerks and bookkeepers for service in draft board offices.

By this authorization one more step was taken toward the complete militarization of draft boards. It was thought that the presence of uniformed men in the draft board offices would tend to raise the discipline of the "soldiers to be." Each local board compiled a list of all such limited service men available in each division. Information thus secured was sent to the Adjutant General's office and when orders were received to induct these men no time was lost.

Saturday, August 24, 1918, was set by presidential proclamation as registration day for those youths who had arrived at the age of 21 years since June 5, 1918. One peculiar phase of the registration of that day was a ruling which excused orthodox Jews from registration until Monday, August 26. This was done in order that the Talmudic inhibition regarding the Jewish Sabbath might not be violated.

Under the original method of caring for the cases of alleged deserters and those who had failed to comply with the Selective Service regulations, if legal proof were not furnished the local board, that the individual in question was in military or naval service, his name was to be placed on the list of deserters or delinquents. This manifestly worked an injustice against certain men who were in military or naval service, but who had not communicated this fact, together with proper affidavits, to their local boards.

The Adjutant General ordered a careful check made of the list of these deserters and delinquents, the idea being to secure a net list of these violators of Selective Service regulations. The procedure was to remove from the list the names of those who, to the knowledge of one or more of the board members, was in military or naval service, had died, or who were incarcerated in insane asylums or were confined in penal institutions or who had enlisted in the armed service of any of our Allies.

By properly carrying out this order an unfair blot on the honor of the State of Minnesota, as well as the United States, was removed, and a correct list of those who had willfully evaded the draft was obtained.

The civilian position of draft board members was one which was not conducive to proper discipline and authority over registrants, and on August 20, 1918, a letter of recommendation to the effect that draft officials should be made officers in the army was sent by the Adjutant General to General Crowder. The letter follows:

"As a result of a survey of the conditions as they exist in the State of Minnesota, I desire to suggest a different mode of procedure regarding the care of members of local and district draft boards and Government appeal agents in order to insure their retention in such positions.

"With the raising of the draft ages, as is proposed by the legislation now pending before Congress, the majority of the draft board members in Minnesota will be included.

"In view of the fact that these men have become experts in the handling of the draft, because of their more than a year of experience, they are entitled to recognition as such experts by the military, and in just the same manner as physicians in the medical corps, lawyers in the judge advocate's department; transportation, textile, food and other experts in the quartermaster's corps; civil engineers in the engineer's corps, and other highly specialized branches of military endeavor.

"The great majority of these patriotic men have given up their business to serve the Government in this capacity, and have endured privations and hardships of all descriptions in order to 'do their bit' for their country.

"In view of the fact that the Government is now preparing to magnificently carry the war on in a greater scale than has ever been thought of by any other nation, it seems only right and just to the men who have made this raising of the National Army possible that they should receive substantial recognition of the fact.

"The great majority of these draft officials have become inoculated with the idea of becoming a part of the armed forces of the United States by very reason of the fact that they have been instrumental in sending into such divisions hundreds of the youth of the country.

"Before the passage of this law increasing the age limits it has been generally considered impossible for these men to get into service, but it is my opinion that you will find a very large number of these same men will refuse to accept deferred classification in the draft if they are to continue serving on the draft board in the capacity of civilians.

"It is my suggestion that commissions as lieutenants and captains be granted to one or more of the board members in each division and that they be placed under the direction of the Judge Advocate's Department, their compensation to be the same as the rank pays in active service, and the wearing of uniforms be made compulsory.

"By doing this two purposes will be served, and the natural craving of these men to have an actual and recognized part in the war will be satisfied.

"The two purposes that will be served are: First, the question of discipline among the drafted men, which

will be more easily enforced, as they will be dealing with a uniformed representative of the army; and Second, the positions draft board members occupy will be raised to the dignity that they properly should have.

"History will undoubtedly recognize the labors of these men as absolutely unique, but it is only human to prefer to have the garlands while breathing than after that operation shall have ceased.

Registration of all those from 18 to 45 years, inclusive, was accomplished on September 12, 1918. The only difficulty during the entire day was the eagerness of the men affected in their desire to register. Registration boards throughout the state were swamped. From the time the registration places opened in the morning until they closed at night a steady stream of registrants passed through the doors.

Minnesota registered a total of 286,243 men, of a total registration for the United States of 12,966,594 men. The first registration on June 5, 1917, produced a total of 222,698 registrants in Minnesota, with a total of 9,586,508 in the country. The second registration on June 5, 1918, in Minnesota gave a total registration of 21,029, and in the United States a total of 744,865. The third registration on August 24 gave Minnesota a total of 3,747 registrants and for the United States a total of 153,054 making a grand total of 533,717 registrants for Minnesota out of a grand total of 23,456,021 in the United States.

A letter of appreciation and recognition of the monumental task so ably performed by all associated with the work of the draft in Minnesota was sent by the Adjutant General shortly after the registration on September 12, 1918, to all persons officially connected with the draft work in Minnesota. The letter follows:

"It is the expectation of this office that September 12th marks the beginning of the end of the first phase of the Selective Service in the United States, and we do not desire to let this opportunity go by to express our admiration and sincere thanks to the men who have so valiantly given their time in the successful endeavor to 'stop the Hun.'

"There have been many times that we have impatiently cried for 'speed, speed, and still more speed,' and have asked for various things from you that may at the time have seemed unreasonable, and in the stress of administration we have not stopped by the wayside to secure the proper perspective on this monumental task. This we have now done and we are astounded at the magnitude of the labors that have been accomplished by you.
