Tears and Cheers at Farewell.

All of Minnesota mingled tears with cheers in August and September of 1917 when Minnesota's three regiments of infantry, one regiment of field artillery and hospital and ambulance units left the state bound on the first lap of the journey which was ultimately designed to land them in France to take their places on the battle line of the world. It was one of the most imposing ceremonies ever witnessed in the state, according to those who had seen soldiers march away to the Civil war and the Spanish-American war.

Largest Number to Leave State.

More than 7,000 officers and men waved and cheered as their special trains pulled away from the stations, and many hundred thousand friends, 'sweethearts, wives and others returned the farewell with smiling faces but aching hearts. It was the largest single entrainment of armed men that had ever left the state bound for a war being fought outside the territorial limits of the United States. There was no confusion during the loading of the trains, as the crowds of well-wishers were kept back of military lines.

General Resche Precedes Men.

The infantry regiments were ordered to proceed to Camp Cody, Deming, N. M., for concentration and training. In order to insure the camp being in condition to receive the men, Brig. Gen. Frederick E. Resche, commander of the First Brigade, Minnesota National Guard, accompanied by his staff, left a few days ahead of the three infantry regiments for Camp Cody. There was much to be done in the location assigned to "Minnesota's Finest" and it was done by the advance guard under direction of General Resche.

Camp Laid Out.

The camp had to be laid out in streets, the locations of the headquarters and the various special locations necessary in an encampment could only be made by someone who had in mind the camp as a whole, and these locations had to be marked. After these details had been attended to, word was sent along the line "back home" and the troops there began their preparations to move to camp.

Third Infantry First to Move.

The first Minnesota unit to begin its long journey to Camp Cody was the Third Infantry, commanded by Col. H. V. Eva. Three special trains carried the members of this organization. From the time their train started until it arrived at Camp Cody these officers and men were the recipients of a tremendous ovation from the excited people who lined the tracks at every city, village and hamlet along the route. Bands played, school children were lined up at the stations, and home-made delicacies were tendered the fighting men from Minnesota who had the honor of being the first to leave for a training camp.

The next organization to break camp was the First Field Artillery. They had been concentrated at Fort Snelling and were fretting and fuming with impatience at the delay in the reception of their orders to move. At last, on September 4, 1917, they received their orders to break camp and proceed to Camp Mills, Mineola, L. I. These orders were received at 9 a.m., but at noon the first of the two special trains whistled its way out of the siding and these men began their hurried journey to France. They were destined to be the first of the Minnesota units to be sent to the "battle fields of democracy," but they did not know it at the time.

Banners, with slogans expressive of the lack of regard in Bannerwhich the enemy was held, were strung along the sides of the coaches. As these trains roared their way through towns and villages lusty cheers were given by the men in khaki to the densely packed platforms of patriotic citizens. The trip was made without any serious trouble of any sort and the men were "on their tiptoes" when they arrived at Camp Mills. Speculation had been rife as to the time they would remain in camp before they would be sent across, but none of the guesses were correct as to the speed with which they would be sent.

Col. George Leach, in command of the First Field Artillery, Leach Thanks said just before the train pulled out of the Fort Snelling side- Folks." tracks: "The men of this unit will never forget the heaping of kindness expressed by the home folks and we go forward to our duty with a light heart and a heavy memory."

The next regiment to leave the state was the Second Infan- Second try, under command of Col. W. T. Mollison. They left on September 27, 1917, in four special trains loaded to the doors with a happy, enthusiastic lot of men. The various companies entrained at their home towns and proceeded southward. The home organizations, such as the commercial clubs, the women's clubs, etc., furnished reading material and smoking tobacco to their "home boys" for consumption en route to camp. Reception committees had been organized in each of the towns passed through, and the personal comfort of each soldier was inquired into in order that he might not lack for anything.

Following a few days' encampment at Lake Phalen the Hospital and Minnesota Field Hospital and ambulance companies left for Camp Cody on September 28, 1917, under the command of Major W. C. Rutherford. They were furnished one special train which left from St. Paul. The entertainment furnished the preceding organizations was repeated for the benefit of these men, and they left for camp with the feeling that the home folks were right behind them in anything that they might need or desire.

Companies

Farewell Parade by First Infantry.

A farewell parade was given by the First Minnesota Infantry on October 9, 1917, in Minneapolis. Governor J. A. A. Burnquist, Brigadier General W. F. Rhinow, Adjutant General of Minnesota, and staff officers personally reviewed these troops at The Parade. Thousands of friends and relatives of the troops lined the bunting and flag decorated streets through which these men, accompanied by their field equipment, marched. The enthusiasm of the spectators was unbounded and the cheering was so loud that several of the soldiers complained of earache after the regiment had returned to the encampment grounds.

First Infantry to War Third Time.

The next day, October 10, 1918, tents were struck, the camp "policed" (cleaned up), and for the third time in the history of the state the First Minnesota Infantry marched away to war. Bands played, flags waved and khaki-clad men hurried around bound on errands, self-inflicted or ordered by their officers. At the word of command, the bugle blared and instant order was brought out of the seeming confusion. Company after company lined up in formation, donned their equipment, and at the word of command marched away to the trains side-tracked on the military reservation.

When the last train had pulled out the only sign of any recent occupancy of the camp grounds by thousands of men were the number of smoldering fires in which refuse had been incinerated. There were no pieces of paper, no garbage, nor any other debris inside the camp limits.

Pledge to Do Best.

"The 'First' will faithfully observe all the old traditions of the regiment and will do their 'bit' in the best manner they know how," was the message left to the patriotic citizens of Minneapolis and St. Paul by Colonel Erle Luce, in command of the regiment.

Spirit of People Wonderful.

These men who had left for camp all bore away with them the blessings of the state, which begged for any opportunity to do what they could to make the life of the Minnesota men, who had joined the regiment, easier. Entertainments, dances and dinners were given the men prior to their leaving and assurances were given them that when they wanted anything all they had to do to get it was to "write home" and they would receive their request. The spirit of the people was wonderful in this respect, according to all the officers and men in the regiments.

Allied Colors Presented to "First."

A stand of the colors of the Allies was presented to the First Field Artillery at the State Capitol on August 24, 1917. These flags were purchased by voluntary contributions secured from the various employes of the Capitol building. Before the colors were presented the flag bearers in the little ceremony were the Misses Mary Dunlop, Mary Becker, Edith Graham, Mable Coonan, Ida Tildequist, Lillian Holmes, Jeanette Paul,

Ella Hudgins, Elizabeth Franks, Mary Callaman, Lillian, Brockman and Hattie Spahr. These were all employes in the Capitol.

The entire regiment was drawn up in front of the Capitol building and were standing at attention when the presentation was made. Following the presentation Governor Burnquist, Adjutant General Rhinow and members of the staff stood on the steps of the building and reviewed the troops.

In order that the members of the federalized National Guard Comfort might not want for the small luxuries that tend to make the monotonous life of the soldier in training bearable, a company and battery fund was subscribed for the various regiments by the citizens of the towns in which the men lived before going to camp. This fund totaled many thousands of dollars, and in many cases those signing the pledges said that as rapidly as the money was used up they could be counted on to replace their contribution. In this manner they could do their duty toward the men who were ready to give up their lives for their country. The money was placed in the hands of the chaplains of the various regiments with instructions to use it for the benefit of the men and to call for more as soon as the fund was exhausted.

When the notice was given Adjutant General Rhinow call- Second Field ing for the federalization of the state militia it was requested Artillery Organized. that three regiments of infantry and two of field artillery be furnished as the quota of Minnesota. This was under date of May 5, 1917. The three regiments of infantry were already organized and one of the field artillery, so the organization of the Second Regiment of Field Artillery was authorized and begun under the direction of Colonel W. J. Murphy, of St. Paul, early in June. The various batteries were stationed at Albert Lea, Waseca, St. James, Marshall, Fergus Falls, Moorhead, St. Paul, and Minneapolis.

It was the expectation that this regiment would be mustered into Federal service immediately on the completion of the recruiting, and in order to hasten this, public-spirited citizens subscribed a recruiting fund in order that not one cent of the preliminary expense of organization would be borne by the State or the United States.

The last unit of the regiment was mustered in on July 26. 1917, and it seemed that it would be only a short time until the regiment would be ordered into active service. Because the members of the regiment had this impression the majority of the 45 officers and the 1,311 men had resigned their positions in civil life and were holding themselves for an immediate call into service.

Regiment Disbanded.

Theoregiment was not inspected by Federal officers prior to August 7, 1917, and in consequence of army regulations could not be immediately drafted into service. The regiment was ordered disbanded on April 30, 1918.

Members Suffer Hardship.

In the meantime complaints poured into the office of the Adjutant General and to the Governor regarding the hardships which were being undergone by the members of this regiment in consequence of their having resigned their positions. Letters and telegrams were shot back and forth between the Adjutant General and the Governor and the War Department, urging immediate drafting of this regiment into Federal service.

It was hoped to the very last that the War Department would grant Minnesota's request for the drafting of this regiment, but all the efforts failed and, finding that the War Department was adamant in its stand that this regiment would not be drafted immediately, the Adjutant General requested permission to disband the unit in order that the members might then join other organizations or return to civil life. When the matter was presented in this light the War Department granted the request and the order was given.

Second Infantry Loses Half Personnel.

It was the understanding of the Adjutant General when the troops went to the concentration and training camp at Camp Cody, Deming, N. M., that they would be trained and sent overseas as a body and not be disrupted. About the middle of May, 1918, Colonel W. T. Mollison, commanding the Second Infantry, wrote that more than 50 per cent of the regiment was in danger of being drafted into replacement units for overseas service and the regiment being filled up with other men from Selective Service drafts. This order, if carried out, would cause the regiment to lose its state personnel, and it was feared that the spirit of cooperation and state honor would be lost.

Trip of Protest Made to Washington.

Telegrams and letters were dispatched by both the Governor and the Adjutant General to all the Minnesota representatives in Congress and the Senate, asking them to intercede with the War Department to have this order cancelled and permit the regiment to remain intact. On May 28, Governor Burnquist and General Rhinow made a flying trip to Washington to protest the order of the War Department in person to Secretary of War Newton D. Baker.

The matter was taken up by Secretary Baker with General March, Chief of Staff, in an endeavor to secure a revocation of the order. Some hope was given and both the Governor and the Adjutant General then returned, confident that every possible effort had been exerted in behalf of "Minnesota's boys."

On June 6, 1918, a formal notification was received by the Order Adjutant General from the War Department to the effect that Revocation. it would be impossible, owing to military necessity, for the order to be revoked and that the depletion of the personnel of the Second Infantry must go on.

This was not the only change made in the personnel of the Third Minnesota troops by the War Department, but it was the one which hurt the most. On September 29, 1917, a telegram was received by General Rhinow to the effect that the Third Infantry had been changed over from an infantry regiment into the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Field Artillery and would from that time on be known by that designation. Not so many changes in the personnel were made in this regiment, and the men dug in and began their instruction as a field artillery organization with a good will. Many of the men in the regiment thought that the change from infantry might mean that they would get "over there" sooner and for that reason they worked the harder.

The "Rainbow Division," of which the First Field Artillery Divisional was a part, held their farewell parade and review at Camp Mills less than one month after their arrival in camp. It was held in the presence of more than 100,000 spectators, many of whom had made the trip from Minnesota to see their boys the last time before embarking for France. More than one hour and thirty minutes were required by the division to pass the reviewing stand. Regiments from all over the United States were included in the "Rainbow Division," and the verdict of the Minnesota spectators was to the effect that the "Old First" now known as the One Hundred and Fifty-first Field Artillery. was far above the remainder of the division in soldierly appearance and presence.

The reason assigned by Colonel Leach for the superiority of Minnesota the Minnesota troops was the spirit of the men who had "dug in like a hunting dog after a rabbit" and had intensively studied the drill tactics with an idea toward attaining perfection. This willingness was not confined alone to the Minnesota troops, but they had acquired a more soldierly bearing, according to the spectators.

Prior to the departure of the First Minnesota Field Artillery "Vimy Ridge" and the First Minnesota Infantry, the military pageant, entitled "Vimy Ridge," was given at the State Fair Grounds for their benefit. About two weeks' preparation preceded the pagean, which was held on the afternoon of August 18, 1917. A representative of the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission, then stationed in Minneapolis, and who had been a participant in the Battle of "Vimy Ridge." personally supervised the production and its stage setting in order that the production might be as nearly as possible a replica of that bloody encounter. A total of
